Grading and evaluating student work in class and at the final exam	The examination of acquired knowledge, skills and competencies is conducted during the semester through the evaluation of student activities and online discussions, seminar work, as well as two colloquia. In accordance with the learning outcomes of the course and the obligations of the student, the final grade is formed with regard to the achievement of the following elements: written exam, ie successfully passed two colloquia (positive grade from both colloquia is equivalent to a written exam) - 60%; according to instructions - 30%; active participation in classes (physical / online discussions, workshops 10%).
